School Description and Mission Statement

Mission Education Center is a K-5 elementary school for newly arrived Spanish speaking immigrant students. This transitional program helps the newcomer students achieve the necessary skills and confidence in order to succeed in regular schools to which they will transfer at the end of one year. Our teachers are Spanish bilingual and credentialed to work with our newcomer population. Our main goals are oral English proficiency, academic success in Spanish and English, and orientation to life in a new community. We encourage parents to become engaged in and supportive of their child's education, through bi-weekly parent education workshops. We work collaboratively with community agencies such as SF School Volunteers, Mission Science Workshop, Performing Arts Workshop, SF Ballet, Lion's Club, Bay Area Community Resources.

All adopted high school instructional materials have been evaluated and determined locally to meet state standards for grades 9-12. Appropriate science laboratory equipment is available for all laboratory science courses.

For Elementary and Middle Schools (grades K-8)

The San Francisco Unified School District adopts instructional materials following the cycle of state frameworks and standards, and adopts K-8 materials from the list of standards-aligned materials that have been adopted by the State Board of Education. The district provides sufficient textbooks for all students to use in class and to take home in the core curriculum areas of reading/language arts, mathematics, science, and history/social studies. For 2018-2019, instructional materials were provided for all students in grades K-8. Replacements were provided for core curriculum areas as identified through a survey and other activities preceding the annual Instructional Materials Hearing at the October 29, 2019 meeting of the Board of Education.

Mission Education Center was renovated with the ADA Bond monies in 2008-2009. The school is now ADA compliant. All of the bathrooms were replaced. The interior and exterior of the building were painted. A new play structure and basketball court was added to the yard. New fencing and yard re-surfacing were completed . New flooring was added throughout the building. A new elevator was built and added to the building. Every classroom has several internet connections. As part of the Bond program, we are in the process of the Green Schoolyard Project. We hired a landscape architect to plan the greening of MEC with the school district and MEC Green Team. Our Green Schoolyard and garden were completed in 2011. MEC has hired a Garden/Green Schoolyard Coordinator.

Choral and instrumental Music is provided to our 3rd-5th graders. A visual art teacher from the VAPA department provides integrated art classes to K-5th classrooms. MEC is a dual language newcomer enrichment program (Spanish bilingual). A Spanish bilingual elementary advisor, a parent liaison, an Instructional Reform Facilitator, a learning support professional, a speech therapist, a librarian, a garden coordinator, and a physical education teacher support the classroom teachers and students. A SES provider, the garden coordinator, ExCEL, and SCORES offer and provide quality after school programs to all our students.
